Subject Animals' right to labour laws

The General Assembly,

Alarmed That reports of animal abuse at touristic sites show that

thousands of animals are cruelly beaten, mistreated, deprived of basic necessities, and laboured to death

Appalled That more than 1.6 billion animals are abused to death

every year, and more than 500 million alone suffer to

entertain tourists

Noting with approval That 119 UN member states have some form of animal

welfare legislation at national level

Understanding That mankind has obligations toward animal and natural

systems

Acknowledging That mankind greatly depends on their interactions with

and usage of animals

Recognizing That animal abuse jeopardizes environmental preservation

and hinders economic and cultural growth

Regretting That no comprehensive international agreement effectively

confronts these abuses

Convinced That substantial improvements in animal welfare can be

ensured through concerted action by all States

Decides That:

- Animal minimum wage be introduced as a way to guarantee

a certain level of animal welfare for animals in the

workforce

- Stricter legal consequences to law infringement concerning

animal cruelty be established

- Regular and thorough controls of compliance with the

aforementioned provisions be carried out by appointed

officials
